Background

Information for the Catechist

This session focuses on who we think God is – for each of us. We also look at the Trinity – the Father, Son and Holy Spirit – through scripture and artwork.



Reflection

As we gather, we light a candle to remember that Jesus is the light of the world.

Sit quietly and listen to the guided meditation. Think back over your day and the week since we last met.

Follow up from last session

Would you like to share your experience of the Rite of Acceptance?

For those already baptised, would you like to reflect on the ritual of welcoming? What do you remember most? What did you experience during the rite?

We have looked previously at how we know God and God's love. Does anyone have any questions?



Exploring (Part A)

In your own mind how do you think of God?

For example: It could be God the Creator, God is everything – father, mother, and friend.

What does it mean to be part of a community?

Think about the word 'communion'. What does it mean for you?

Communion is when we experience oneness with each other. As a Christian, 'communion' means to be one with God and all people in the world.

What do you know about the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit?

What have you heard about the Trinity?

The Trinity includes the Father, Son and Holy Spirit who together are One God. God is a Holy Trinity, a communion of love between these three persons, a communion which invites us in. God is oneness and we are invited into this oneness.

Let us look at what the Trinity means.

Activity

On the next page is an artwork, an icon of the Trinity painted around 1410 by Andrei Rublev.

What do you see in this picture, this icon?

The icon reveals the Trinity in the form of three angels, symbolising the equality of all three persons, staffs showing their divine power. It shows God the Father, the Creator on the left blessing the Son in the middle. The Son, who was sent to serve, blesses the cup on the table. On the right is the Spirit with his hand resting near the cup, showing he is with the Son on his mission.

There is room at this table for each of us. This icon encourages us to sit at the table with the Lord.

The three angels sit in a circle – representative of the unity of the Holy Trinity. The circle is not closed off, but remains open – an invitation for us to enter into the conversation.

Behind the Father, is a house that represents Abraham's "tent" as described in the Genesis account (18:1); the open-doored house of the Father, the goal of our journey.

The Holy Spirit is clothed in green and blue hues: the colours of the Earth.

The Son is clothed in bright red cloaked in blue, representing the Divine (red) and human (blue) natures.

Above him is the oak of Mamre. Representing the tree of life a common symbol of the Cross, from which Jesus would be hung.





Exploring (Part B)

Let us listen to a reading from Matthew which refers to the Trinity.



Matthew 3: 16-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.



Glory to you, O Lord.

When Jesus had been baptised, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." The Gospel of the Lord.



Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

At his Baptism, Jesus saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and heard God's voice telling him he was God's beloved Son.

At your Baptism, you will be baptised by name – "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" – as a beloved child of God.

Do you know **how** to make the Sign of the Cross?

Do you know why we make the Sign of the Cross

- It reminds us of our Baptism
- It reminds us of the Trinity
- · It reminds us to whom we belong



For those who want to know more

We are now going to look at some more scripture passages that refer to the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit – the Trinity. The word trinity doesn't appear in the Bible however in some passages we see where the Father, Son and Holy Spirit are linked.

Ask someone to read one of the following Bible passages slowly for the group.

John 14:9

Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'?"

John 14:26

But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you.

Matthew 28:19-20

Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age.

Following a couple of minutes of silence to reflect on the scripture invite the young person to respond with a word or phrase that struck them from the passage.



Aim

To show the young person that God speaks to us in many ways, one of which is through the Bible.

To assist the young person in investigating the various parts of the Bible, especially the Gospels.

Preparation

Background

Information for Catechist

The Bible is the living word; it is not stuck in history but it is alive today.

The Bible is still the world's bestselling book. It is a library of many different books, divided into two parts: The Old Testament stories tell about the covenant between God and God's people; The New Testament beginning with the four Gospels about Jesus, followed by the Acts of the Apostles and the various letters gives us an understanding of the birth of the early Church and earliest Christian communities. For over four thousand years the Bible has sustained people in times of sadness and of joy. It is a life-long journey to explore the Bible. We are nourished by reading the word of God.

What does the priest do at Mass after reading the Gospel? He kisses the book because of the words it contains. This shows us the importance of reverence for the Bible as the word of God.

As we gather, we light a candle to remember that Jesus is the light of the world.

Sit quietly and listen to the guided meditation. Think back over your day and the week since we last met.

Exploring

In what ways does God speak to us? To you?

What are some ways you can get to know God more?

Where do you think we can find messages from God?

- Explore the contents page of your Bible.
- Explore the Old and New Testaments. Compare the size of each.
- There is a difference between the Old and the New Testament. The Old Testament can also be called the Hebrew Scriptures or the First Testament. The New Testament tells the stories of Jesus and his followers.
- Explore the books in the Bible. Which of these names have you heard before?
- Can you find Matthew, Mark, Luke and John?
- Notice how each book of the Bible is divided into numbered chapters. Smaller numbers in the chapters are for verses. For example the first book of the Bible is the Book of Genesis and the first verse is: "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth ..." (Genesis 1:1).

Activity

Tell the young person that finding references in the Bible is a bit like reading a secret code! Demonstrate how to read a Bible reference. For example, Matthew 6:34 means the book of Matthew chapter 6 verse 34.

The Activity Sheet: Scripture Quotes contains the following scripture quotes that can be cut out. This can be downloaded from the crossroadsrcia website: www.crossroadsrcia.org (copy on page 19).

Print and cut out the quotes and put them on the table/ground for the young person to see.

Exploring Part A

Friends of Jesus

What qualities make a good friend?

Do you know the name of any of Jesus' friends?

Do you know any stories about the friends of Jesus?

How do we become friends of Jesus? We read in the scripture passage below that Jesus calls us his friends.



John 15:15

"I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father."

"I have called you friends." In the scripture passage above, Jesus refers to us as his friends as he shares with us all that he has heard from his Father.

Being friends with Jesus means that we share with our friends the love that Jesus gives us. Love is the heart of friendship.

How else could we experience being friends with Jesus?

We could be his friend by talking to him through the day, reading the Bible, and listening to his words. We could also reach out to others in friendship.

3 JESUS

In this film clip we hear that Christianity is the experience of encountering Jesus in the here and now. What does this mean to you?

What are my responses to watching this clip?

Are there any insights, new ideas, questions or challenges you have after watching this clip?

Disciples saw, heard, touched and ate with Jesus after he rose from the dead. When encountering Jesus we find out the full truth of who God is and the full truth of who we really are.

During Jesus' public ministry, he spent 3 years healing, calling others, teaching, listening, and praying. He called others to follow him and to be his disciples. Some examples of encountering Jesus are in the following scripture passages. Choose one to read through.




Luke 19:1-10

Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through it. A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature.

So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today".

So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner".

Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."



John 4:7-16

A Samaritan woman came to draw water,nd Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." (His disciples had gone to the city to buy food.) The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.)

Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water?

Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?" Jesus said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life."



The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

When encountering Jesus, there are several things that can happen. Let us break open the scripture reading from John 4: 7-16.

When we encounter Jesus we change. In the passage from John's Gospel above, the Samaritan woman then confronts and challenges Jesus: "Give me a drink". The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.)

Jesus replies to the Samaritan woman "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water". God shows us things that we didn't know we needed. God can answer what is in our hearts, even when we didn't know it needed answering.

Each of us can encounter Jesus in a unique way. He meets us where we are at.

Jesus calls us:

- by name
- into a personal relationship with him
- to share our life with him
- to recognise who we are
- to be more than who we are.

We are changed by encountering Jesus.

We are invited to be in relationship with Jesus. In the scripture passage we see this: "The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life".

It is up to us to say yes. Yes to developing a relationship with Jesus and also yes to becoming a disciple of Jesus. The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water".

When we encounter Jesus, we can't stay the same.



Exploring Part B

Jesus calls each one of us to be a disciple.

Do you know that Jesus wants to be part of your everyday life?

What helps you to become a disciple of Jesus?

- Loving God with all your heart, soul, and mind and by loving your neighbour as yourself.
- You inviting other people to live this way too.

The disciples became apprentices of Jesus through regular contact, breaking bread together, sitting with each other.

How do we sit with Jesus? How do we listen to Jesus?

What does it mean to be an apprentice of Jesus?

Exploring Part A

What are Sacraments?

Sacraments are a visible sign of an invisible grace. What Jesus did in life, we now do through the sacraments. Jesus fed and healed people, was filled with the Holy Spirit and continues to give us the Holy Spirit today. Jesus was baptised by John the Baptist and continues to plunge us into the new life of Baptism.

Sacraments bring us to a deeper relationship with God and are a physical sign of God's love, grace and presence in our lives. Before he returned to the Father, Jesus promised that he would be with us always, saying:



Matthew 28:20

"I am with you always, to the end of the age."

There are 7 sacraments in the Catholic Church:

- Baptism
- Confirmation
- Eucharist
- Penance
- Marriage
- Holy Orders
- Anointing of the Sick

As Catholics what we celebrate in sacraments is reflected in the earthly life of Jesus.

Exploring Part B

Baptism

The first sacrament we receive is the Sacrament of Baptism.

This was the start of Jesus' ministry and your Baptism will be the start of your Christian life. Jesus shows us how to live the Christian life.

Symbols of Baptism

Sacramental Policy of the Brisbane Archdiocese, Sept 2015

In Baptism, God adopts us as children and makes us a new creation through water and the Holy Spirit.

When you are baptised, water will be used as a sign of new life. You will either be immersed in water or have water poured over you by the priest as he calls you by name and says "I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Water

Water gives life to us in the world and the water in Baptism will give you the life of God. You will be welcomed into the Church community.

• White Garment

You will be clothed in a white garment during your Baptism to signify your new life in Christ, to show that you are clothed in the risen Christ.

• Oil

You will be anointed with oil as a son or daughter of Christ. It is also a sign that you are called to be a member of the Christian community.

Light

During your Baptism, a candle is lit from the Paschal Candle and presented to you as you are called to be the light of Christ in this world.

The celebrant will pray the following:

44 RCIA 297

"You have been enlightened by Christ. Walk always as children of the light and keep the flame of faith alive in your hearts".

Through your Baptism, you are called to be light for the world like Jesus and to keep the flame of faith alive in your heart.

Confirmation

The second Sacrament of Initiation is Confirmation.



Acts 2:1-4

On the day of Pentecost all the Lord's followers were together in one place. Suddenly there was a noise from heaven like the sound of a mighty wind! It filled the house where they were meeting. Then they saw what looked like fiery tongues moving in all directions, and a tongue came and settled on each person there. The Holy Spirit took control of everyone, and they began speaking whatever languages the spirit let them speak.

We can't see the Holy Spirit but we know that when we act like Jesus, the Holy Spirit is with us and we see the effects of the Holy Spirit. We can't see the wind, but we know it is there by looking at the effect it has on the trees as they sway to and fro.

In Confirmation, the Holy Spirit empowers us and strengthens us by giving us the gifts of the Holy Spirit to help us live the Christian way of life. During Confirmation the priest will pray for you:



RCIA 301

Send your Holy Spirit upon them to be their helper and guide. Give them a spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of right judgement and courage the spirit of knowledge and reverence. Fill them with the spirit of wonder and awe in your presence.

These are the gifts of the spirit.

- Wisdom
- Understanding
- Right Judgement
- Courage
- Knowledge
- Reverence
- Wonder and Awe



These are gifts we receive from the Holy Spirit to help us live a Christian life. (For more information see <u>God's Love Poured Out – Prayers and Reflections</u>).

Symbols of Confirmation

- Laying on of hands During Confirmation, the priest will pray a special prayer over you, calling down the Holy Spirit: "Send your Spirit upon your child to be their helper and guide".
- Oil of Chrism The oil of Chrism is consecrated oil and is sweet smelling. The priest 'seals' you with the oil of Chrism and calls you by name saying "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit.' It is a sign of the Holy Spirit and completes your Baptism. The priest says "Peace be with you", and you reply "And with your spirit". Oil is a symbol of strengthening and anointing; its perfume is a symbol of the fragrance of Christ. It is also a sign that we are called to be a member of the Christian community.





In the Gospels, we read about Jesus sharing a meal with his friends on the night before Jesus died, for the Jewish ritual of Passover. The Passover was a festival that remembered the last meal of the Jewish people before their flight out of Egypt. In Exodus 12, we hear that Moses led the Jewish people out of slavery to the Promised Land. A lamb was used as a sacrifice for the festival and the Passover has been celebrated for over 4000 years.

Listen carefully to these words from the Eucharistic Prayer in the Mass:

Eucharist Prayer (III)

For on the night he was betrayed he himself took bread, and, giving you thanks, he said the blessing, broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying:

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND EAT OF IT; FOR THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH WILL BE GIVEN UP FOR YOU.

In a similar way, when supper was ended, He took the chalice, and, giving you thanks, he said the blessing, and gave the chalice to his disciples, saying:

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND DRINK FROM IT: FOR THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD, THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT. WHICH WILL BE POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS.

Do this in memory of me. †

What might you have seen, heard and felt if you had been at the Last Supper?

Do you think the disciples understood what Jesus was saying as they shared this meal with him?

Catholics throughout the ages – even until today – have continued to follow Jesus' commands to share bread and wine through the Eucharist, knowing that Jesus, through his Holy Spirit will change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus.

After his resurrection, the disciples recognised Jesus in the blessing, breaking, and sharing of bread.



Matthew 14: 30-31

When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognised him.



In the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke and in Paul's first letter to the people of Corinth we hear the story of the Last Supper when Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and shared it with his disciples. Jesus also took the cup of wine, blessed it and shared it with his disciples.



Mark 14:22-25

While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."



1 Corinthians 11:23-26

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Adoration



Matthew 28:20

And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

Before ascending to heaven, Jesus promised his disciples, and therefore us, that he would be with us always. God fulfils this promise through the Eucharist – which is the real presence of Jesus. The Eucharist takes the appearance of bread and wine however Jesus, through his Holy Spirit will change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus. The Eucharist is not a symbol or a re-enactment of the Last Supper.



Luke 22:19-20

Jesus took bread and when he had given thanks he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me". And likewise he took the cup after supper, saying, "This cup which is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood".

Adoration takes place after a consecrated host is placed in a sacred vessel, called a monstrance. While the host is in the monstrance we are able to see the host, which is the real presence of Jesus. For many people this is a wonderful opportunity for prayer and meditation in the presence of the Blessed Eucharist.



The Introductory Rites

Matthew 18:20

For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

- **Penitential Act** before hearing God's word, we acknowledge our sins and ask for mercy and God's pardon.
- Gloria except in Advent and Lent.
- **Collect** prayer from the Mass of the day. The priest pauses to allow the assembly to pray their own prayer silently. Then the priest "collects" these prayers and offers them to God.

The Liturgy of the Word

Romans 10:17

So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.

During the Liturgy of the Word at Sunday Mass, we listen to the word of God through the scripture readings. The readings for the Liturgy of the Word are read from the Lectionary. The Lectionary is made up of scripture readings taken from the Bible arranged in a three year cycle.



The first reading is usually taken from the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament), the Responsorial Psalm is taken from the book of Psalms and the second reading is from the New Testament.

The Gospel reading is from the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke or John. Prayers and texts are taken from the Roman Missal.

Let's look at the Lectionary and read this week's Gospel reading.

The Liturgy of the Word also includes:

- **Homily** the priest helps us to understand how the readings relate to our life today.
- Profession of Faith (the Creed) together we proclaim a statement of our faith, beliefs that have been handed down to us by generations of people of faith
- **Prayer of the Faithful** we bring our prayers for the Church, the world and ourselves to God.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist



Luke 22:19

Do this in memory of me.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist is the central part of the Mass.

It includes:

- **Procession of the Gifts** the bread and wine are brought to the altar to be consecrated during the Eucharistic Prayer.
- Eucharistic Prayer we remember the words and actions of Jesus at the Last Supper as the bread and wine are consecrated through the power of the Holy Spirt and become the Body and Blood of Christ. We prepare to receive the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion. When we sing or say the Great Amen, we are saying that we agree with all the words spoken by the priest throughout the Eucharistic Prayer.
- **Lord's Prayer** we pray together the words that Jesus gave us. Read Matthew 6:9-13.
- **Sign of Peace** the priest offers us peace and then invites us to share a sign of peace with others.
- **Breaking of the Bread** just as Jesus gave thanks, broke the bread and shared it with his disciples, the priest breaks the bread to share with those receiving Communion.
- Communion procession those who are receiving Communion are invited to process together to the table of the Lord to receive the Body and Blood of Christ.
- **Prayer after Communion** prayer from the Mass of the day.

The Concluding Rites



John 13:15

For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

The Concluding Rites include:

- **Blessing** we receive God's blessing before going out to take the love of Jesus into the world.
- **Dismissal** we are sent forth to serve and help other people like Jesus did.

Background

Information for the Catechist

One of the ways that people live a Christian life is through prayer. Prayer is another richness of our faith. It sustains us in the good and bad times, in the happy and sad times. There is a lot of information in this session – pay attention to the area or type of prayer that the young person is interested in, and focus the session on that area.

Exploring Part 1

Prayer

God loves us and wants us to have a relationship with him. We develop and maintain a relationship with God through prayer. As we do with our friends, we share good things and bad things that happen in our day.

It is one of the ways that people live a Christian life. Prayer is another richness of our faith. It sustains us in the good and bad times, in the happy and sad times. Our prayers can take many forms.

Three types of prayer:

Private prayer Prayer that you do alone, anywhere. You can pray while

doing any activity.

Communal prayer Anywhere you gather as a community to pray.

Liturgical Includes Mass or any liturgy that follows ritual.

How can you pray?

Do you pray on the go – such as on the way to an exam or doing some chores?

Where do you pray?

What do you pray about?

Why do you pray?

We pray to create a relationship with the Lord. Start with 5 mins a day – see how that works.

Prayer is opening our hearts in conversation with God. Prayer is a conversation with God and it helps us to have a relationship with God.

We can say prayers of:

Blessing

An example of a Blessing is in the book of Numbers.

The Lord bless you and keep you;

the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.

Praise

An example of praise is in 1 Chronicles.

Thanksgiving

An example of thanksgiving is found in the gospel of Luke

Exploring Part 2

The Examen

The Examen is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day. The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our daily living.

St. Ignatius Loyola thought that the Awareness Examen was a gift that came directly from God, and that God wanted it to be shared as widely as possible. It's a habit that Jesuits, and many other Christians, practice to this day.

Daily Examen

Take a moment to close your eyes and remember the day.

1. Ask God for Light.

Psalm 119:105

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

Talk to God about your day.

2. Give thanks.

What are you grateful for today? Thank God for this.

3. Review the day.

What disappointed you today? Speak to God about this.

4. Consider your choices.

Guided by the Holy Spirit, think about your choices today, is there something you need to say sorry for and ask for God's help?

5. Look toward the day to come.

Being a disciple of Jesus how can you use your gifts in the day ahead? Give thanks to God in your own words.



There are so many different ways to pray. In this section we will look at some more formal and informal ways of praying.

The 5 Finger prayer

Using the fingers on your hand, start with the thumb and pray these intentions in this order:

- 1. On your thumb, pray for those who are closest to you.
- 2. On the next finger, the index, pray for those who teach you, instruct you and heal you. They need support and wisdom to show direction to others.
- 3. On the tall finger, pray for our leaders, governors and those who have authority. They need God's guidance.
- 4. The fourth finger is the ring finger. It is our weakest finger. It reminds us to pray for the weak, the sick or those with problems. They need your prayers.
- 5. And finally on the smallest finger, pray for you. After praying for the other four groups, you will be able to see your own needs in the proper perspective, and you will be able to pray for your own needs in a better way.

Exploring Part 1

Why is Mary so Important?

The first among saints is Mary, the Mother of God. Mary gave her life to God by saying "Yes" when asked to be the mother of Jesus. We are also called to say "Yes" to God in our lives and to bring God's love to those we meet.

Mary was attentive and open to God just as we are asked to be attentive and open.
The Catholic Church has always given prominence to Mary's role in God's saving plan. We see Mary's role in the scriptures in Luke 1 in what is termed the Annunciation where God reveals to Mary, through Gabriel, his angel, that she has been chosen to be the mother of Jesus.



Luke 1:26-31

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you. "But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus.



Mary's response to God's message is in Luke 1:38.



Luke 1:38

Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

Mary's response is to say "Yes" to God. She hears the word of God and lives this out in her life. She is the first disciple and the model of true discipleship.

Because Mary was chosen to be the mother of Jesus and because she lived her life with great faith, Catholics have a special prayer to Mary, known as the Hail Mary. We believe in the power of her intercession with the risen Lord, her Son. We ask her to speak for us, intercede for us with her Son.

When we pray the Hail Mary, the beginning is taken from scripture, and they contain the words spoken to Mary by God's angel Gabriel and by her relative Elizabeth.



The Hail Mary

Hail Mary full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb Jesus. Holy Mary Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Which of these qualities do we see in each other?



Exploring Part 2

There are other people in our Church who are recognised because they have said "Yes" to God in their life. Australia's first Saint, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop said "Yes" to God in her life by recognising the need to educate the poor.



Exploring Part 1

What does it mean to be a Christian and to live a Christian life?

In our Baptism, we are clothed in Christ.

In Confirmation we are gifted by the Holy Spirit.

In the Eucharist we are fed at the table of the Lord.

In each of these sacraments we are enlightened by Christ and sent out into the world to be disciples. Eucharist is the ongoing sacrament. We are fed each week through this sacrament.

How do we live this life?

In exploring how to live a Christian life we can look to the fruits of the spirit. The gifts given to us through the Holy Spirit bear fruit in us and can be seen in our actions and attitudes. The fruits are the results of choosing to living a faith-filled life. The fruits of the spirit are listed in Galatians 5.

If we turn from self towards God, our understanding and our will become nobler and readier to embrace all that is good: if we never rise above the slough of our own miseries we do ourselves a great disservice.

Gentleness

Self-control



2 Peter 1:5-6

For this very reason, you must make every effort to support your faith with goodness, and goodness with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with endurance, and endurance with godliness.

Self-control or temperance is one of the difficult attributes that is often associated with over-indulgence. We exercise self-control when we take responsibility for our actions and choices. Self-control requires us to act out of composure and self-discipline. It is the Spirit who teaches us and empowers us when we trust in God.



Proverbs 25:28

Like a city breached, without walls, is one who lacks self-control.



Old Testament Laws - The 10 Commanments

- I am the LORD your God. You shall worship the Lord your God and Him only shall you serve.
- 2. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 3. Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day.
- 4. Honour your father and your mother.
- 5. You shall not kill.
- 6. You shall not commit adultery.
- 7. You shall not steal.
- 8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.
- 9. You shall not covet your neighbour's wife.
- 10. You shall not covet your neighbour's goods.

The 10 Commandments were given to Moses by God on Mount Sinai and they are rules to guide us. They are a good moral compass on how we should live our life. They are fundamental duties to God, to ourselves and to our neighbours. Jesus refers to the 10 commandments in Matthew 19.



Matthew 19:16-21

Then someone came to him and said, "Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?" And he said to him, "Why do you ask me about what is good? There is only one who is good. If you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments." He said to him, "Which ones?" And Jesus said, "You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; Honour your father and mother; also, You shall love your neighbour as yourself." The young man said to him, "I have kept all these; what do I still lack?" Jesus said to him, "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me."

But it is more than following rules, Jesus gives us this guidance which helps us to live a fuller life. If we treat others like Jesus wants us to we live a more abundant life. It's not a matter of not being allowed to steal or murder. It's about living how Jesus wants us to in order that our lives might be more rich and satisfying.

Circle of Influence

All of us have things we worry about in this world, things we would like to be able to change. These can encompass a wide range of concerns like climate change and war. Many of the things we worry about are not things that we can control. These worries are called our Circle of Concern.

Concern) it is most helpful to focus our attention and energy on the things we can influence (things in our Circle of Influence). When we focus on things that we can change, we feel stronger and our circle of influence may expand.



Why is it called the Rite of Election?

Not because we vote in a general election to choose someone but because God chose a person to be his own. The Church and community who are present also witness this choice.

We know that someone is chosen because of how they live their lives. Like we have seen in previous sessions, we see God working in those who live a Christian life.

Why the Enrolment of Names?

The Archbishop asks if you wish to enter fully into the life of the Church through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Your response is "I do" and then you are invited to write your name in the Book of the Elect.

For those attending the Rite of Election & Enrolment of Names

The Rite of Election and Enrolment of Names is a celebration where the Church formally approves the catechumen's readiness for receiving the Sacraments of Initiation, and the elect (the catechumens) express desire to receive the sacraments.

Background Information

The Rite of Election ends the Catechumenate period. The Archdiocese of Brisbane states The Rite of Election is for those adults and children over the age of reason who are not yet baptised.

This rite is usually held on the first Sunday of Lent in the Cathedral. If this is not held during Lent or if it is not possible for the young person to attend the Cathedral, a Rite of Election can be held at the local parish.

This step is called election because the acceptance made by the Church is founded on the election by God, in whose name the Church acts. The step is also called the enrolment of names because as a pledge of fidelity the candidates inscribe their names in the book which lists those who have been chosen for initiation. (RCIA 106)


Through the voice of the Church the children feel special. The purpose of the Rite of Election is to transition to the period of Purification and Enlightenment and this happens ritually.

CC RCIA 106

With deliberate will and an enlightened faith they must have the intention to receive the sacraments of the Church, a resolve they will express publicly in the actual celebration of the rite.

During the Rite of Election, the godparents and catechists give witness to the catechumen's intention to be a follower of Christ and the catechumen's readiness to receive the Sacraments of Initiation.

The Rite of Election can be found from RCIA 116.
